Strategic Work Plan

At the AGM in January 2013, a motion was passed to develop a strategic work plan which would be presented to the membership for approval and would sustain any changes to the executive over the next 3-5 years.

From the members that were present at the AGM, a small committee was convened and assigned the task identifying key projects and routine maintenance tasks for the work plan. A number of these jobs can be accomplished by club members who are willing and able to tackle the challenge. This list includes routine repairs and painting of outhouses, sheds, target stands, brush clearing, building benches and other small construction projects.

Capital projects that will require the skills and expertise of licensed contractors include assessment and upgrade of the air exchange system in the indoor range, removal of inground oil tanks and installation of one above ground tank, structural addition to the clubhouse to include a separate office, kitchen, and a universal washroom. Availability of a water source will permit improved hand-washing practices and enable us to do a better job of keeping the clubhouse clean.

Obviously, these projects will require some significant funding and communication with a variety of municipal and government departments to obtain all the proper permits.

Once cost estimates are available for the capital projects, a special general meeting will be called for presentation to members in order to obtain their approval to move forward.

With a vision to be involved in the development of a gun club worthy of a five star rating, a considerable amount of work was accomplished at the range by past president, Geoff Fletcher. He ensured that all members, both new and old, received an orientation tour prior to being issued with a key to the gate, acknowledging that respect for the range and understanding of the rules would be better achieved when individuals received consistent information at a personal level.

SAFETY ON THE FIRING LINE

As a reminder:

Every member is responsible for ensuring that they handle their firearms safely at the range and that they comply with the range rules.

Anyone can call a cease fire when there is a situation observed that is not safe.

Flags must be used at each range area.

When the GREEN flag or square is raised it means that a CEASE FIRE is in place and NO shooting is permitted. The GREEN



flag will be up when people are down range setting up targets.

The safety rules are posted at all of the various range areas,

Each range area is approved for a specific class of firearm, caliber and type of ammunition to ensure a safe shooting en-

vironment. For example, the Trap Range is approved for shot-

guns only and you can shoot .22 cal handgun and rifle at the indoor range, but discharging a .50 BMG is not permitted anywhere at the range. These approvals are renewed on a five

Activating the amber lights at the center fire and silhouette areas is an additional indicator that someone is down range.

When the RED flag or square is raised it means that the range is LIVE and shooting is permitted.

Any handling of your

firearm, whether it is a sight or scope adjustment or cycling the action, will be done at the firing line and only when it is safe to do so and there is no one down range.

Take your time—

Scan the line and make sure it is safe to shoot.
